After the ceremony several members met at Appleby's for a free lunch and then met to attend as guest to the Hurricanes game. The University Theatre at North Carolina State University in Raleigh presented 6 performances of the Shirley Lauro play, "A Piece of My Heart," which tells the story of 6 women who served in Vietnam. The presentation was October 28-November 7, 2010

The new book about Vietnam, <u>The Matterhorn</u> will be discussed at 7:00 PM, December 13th at Quail Ridge Book store. This editor has not read it at this time but understands it has great reviews. This would be a great venue for NCVVI to attend.

<u>21 and a Wake Up, an</u> independent film written, produced, and directed by Vietnam Veteran, Chris McIntyre. It stars Danica McKellar, Faye Dunaway and Amy Acker. It has the distinction of being the first American film about the Vietnam War to be filmed on location in Vietnam. The film based on real events, is set at the 24th Evacuation hospital at Long Binh, and follows the lives of three young nurses. Keep an eye out for it!

"The Last Firebase," Ted Sampley's old POW Shack that set for decades between the Lincoln Memorial and the Vietnam Memorial was destroyed by fire. The Shack was now owned I believe by Rolling Thunder and will be rebuilt.

Vietnam gets \$1 million from the US to locate missing Vietnamese troops. There is an estimated 300,000 North Vietnamese soldiers still unaccounted for since the end of the war in 1975.

Global Spectrum Foundation (who we work through with the Orphanage) is very interested in doing a joint Casino Night with NCVVI for the Orphanage. It will be in Fairfax, Va. area. They would like to do it during TET. This year TET, the year of the Cat, is February 3, 2011 and the closest Saturday is February 5th. But our "pit boss" Dave Samuels and the North Carolina Vietnam Veterans Helicopter Pilots are scheduled for the POW/MIA ceremony. Even Dave can't be in two places at the same time. So January 29th has been suggested. More information to come as it develops.

Dave is also talking with people at Wake Med. about another Casino Night to be held at Heather Hills in January. This fee will go to the NCVVI treasury where it is badly needed. NCVVI needs commitments from its members and a special training night was discussed, to train Black Jack and Texas Holdem dealers.

The local NCVVI Casino night for the Nuoc Ngat Orphanage Playground has been delayed for now. But it will be rescheduled for a later date.

Bill Dixon is to talk with Le at the Dalat Restaurant about a Charity Luncheon for the Playground to be held March 5th after the POW/MIA ceremony. The Marine Corps League of Orange County will be the guest readers. Tickets will be coming for members to get donations.

Books You may like to read

SEARGEANT BACK AGAIN: After 30 years from its debut, Charles Coleman's (he lives in Morrisville, NC) ground breaking and insightful novel depicting the early signs of PTSD. The book is being hailed by scholars, medical doctors, historians and film critics as the first and most penetrating study of combat-related psychological trauma ever written. It is often cited as "the Vietnam War cult-classic that made PTSD real."

MARBLE MOUNTAIN: By Bud Willis a marine who flew more than 640 combat missions. (to be released in 2011) This is the story of "Medevac" out of Marble Mountain near Danang.

THIS TIME WE WIN: REVISITING THE TET OFFENSIVE: By James Robbins. Robbins explains, "The TET 'defeat' lies in wait when U.S. forces engaged weak, unconventional enemies who lash out under exceptional circumstances and briefly capture media attention. Terrorist such as Osama bin Laden view Vietnam as an example of the victory they are seeking: a vicious attack on the American spirit that result in demoralizing at home and full-scale retreat abroad."

XO: INTO THE IA DRANG VALLEY: By Alan Berry, he is a former U.S. Army artillery officer. The book chronicles the author's experiences as a young 1st Air Calvary Division artillery officer during the early stages of the Vietnam War

Trivia Answer: The genesis of "Project Eldest Son" was from the mind of SOG's commander, 1966-68, Col. John K. Singlaub, a World War II veteran of covert actions. It was the calculated handiwork of one of the Vietnam War's most secret and least understood covert operations. The operation was so secret that few G.I. s in South East Asia ever heard of it. Though obscure, this trick was not new. The project was for a lab in Okinawa to sabotage the enemies 7.62mm and 12.7mm ammunition with a special exploding powder generating a whopping 250,000psi. They also developed a special fuse for the Communist 82mm mortar round. 1,968 of these rounds were sabotaged. When a SOG team discovered an ammo dump, they planted Eldest Son; when a SOG team ambushed an enemy patrol, they switched a magazine containing one sabotaged round in the dead soldier's weapon and left it in place.
