North Carolina Broadcasters Join Forces to Fete Vietnam Vets: Statewide broadcast of "Welcome Home" event will salute local soldiers

Broadcasters across North Carolina are thanking veterans of the Vietnam War for their service in a significant way with an **all-day** event planned for March 31, along with a telecast that most TV stations across the state, and the majority of radio outlets, plan to air live. "Welcome Home" will be held at Charlotte Motor Speedway, with perhaps 40,000 spectators checking out musical performances, a motorcycle parade, parachutists and speeches from war heroes and stars. A moment of silence will be observed to remember those killed in action.

The USO of North Carolina is crafting the live event. The inspiration for Welcome Home came from WXII Greensboro's Flight of Honor program, which saw the station reach out to the market's World War II veterans, and fly them to Washington to visit the War Memorial and meet with their elected representatives. Moved by the initiative, North Carolina Senator Richard Burr is working with the broadcast community to do something special for Vietnam veterans as well.

"North Carolina Association of Broadcasters, the USO of North Carolina and the Charlotte Motor Speedway, working with Senator Richard Burr's office, are coming together to give those who served our country a proper homecoming," says John Idler, incoming president of North Carolina Association of Broadcasters (NCAB) and WTVD Raleigh's president and general manager.

Some 200,000-plus North Carolina residents served in the war. The region is rich in military families; President Obama was at Fort Bragg Wednesday to thank troops and signal the end of the U.S. military's mission in Iraq. The state's broadcasters will reach out to Vietnam veterans, and invite them to the event, through a series of PSAs. The large majority of stations will then air the event live 2-3 p.m. March 31. "We plan to blanket the state with coverage," says NCAB outgoing president Danny Highsmith.

Organizers are in talks with A-list Hollywood talent about performing in Charlotte. Broadcasters have increased their efforts of late to thank Vietnam vets for their service, and help make up for the harsh treatment many received after returning home from the war. Wisconsin Public Television saluted its state's war veterans with a similar event at Lambeau Field in May of 2010, with several public and commercial stations across the state airing a documentary about Wisconsin's Vietnam veterans.

NCAB officials are hoping to have all NC TV stations on board with the program. "We've had terrific buy in from member stations," says Idler.

Prisoner of War U Minh Forest -October 1963-November 1967 Second Special Forces Detachment -Team Medic Captured with Rocky Versace & Nick Rowe

I was a prisoner for four years in the U Minh Forest. They kept me in a bamboo cage all those years, four feet wide by six feet long, just enough to sit up in. When I think about the guys that died in captivity and the guys that lived, it was just the difference of two words: "IF" and "When." A guy saying, "If I go home" or "If I am released"-he's buried. But those who said, "When I go home" or "When I Escape" or "When the War is over"-We survived.

We were in Jungle –Swamp areas where we were up to our waist in muck....Leeches....Snakes! I'm five feet eight and I weigh ninety-five to one hundred pounds. I had amoebic dysentery-I was going to the toilet ten, twenty times a day. I had Malaria. You learn to live day to day. When I got up in the morning, "If I can just make it to noon.... Now if I can just make it to the evening meal and then go to bed.

I've seen Mosquitoes so thick on my ankles that I thought I had on black socks. I got strung up once. The guards strung me up in the rafters outside my cage. They stripped me naked and tied ropes around my wrist and ankles. They let me hang all night. The next morning, my eyes were swollen shut from Mosquito bites. They stayed shut for a whole week.

The only way I can explain it –In the short time that I was a prisoner, four years, I learned to live with pain and the threat of death. It's the feeling of abandonment that destroys you. We were told "The War might end tomorrow. But we can keep you here forever." It was hard to drive ourselves on day after day when the guards showed us newspaper stories of protesters flying the VC and North Vietnam flag around the Washington Monument, while students burned American Flags.

National Personnel Records Center tips for DD214 requests and safeguarding information.

The Majority of personnel have been moved to the new location and the military personnel records are in the process of moving. The entire moved should be completed by the end of the summer of 2012.

As a reminder, all retirees and Honorably Discharges veterans should ensure that their family knows the location of their military Separation Document (DD 214 from 1950 to present and WD (War Department) form 53-55 and other variations prior to 1955). Note that registering a copy at the county courthouse may make the document a public record. Separation documents issued after 1969 may contain a Social Security Number which could be used for identity theft. Storing the document in a safe deposit box may make it difficult to retrieve immediately upon the death of the retiree or the honorably discharged veteran. The better storage locations are: 1 – Fire safe in a secure location of the house (not in the bedroom, as it is where most thieves search first). Be sure Spouse/Next of Kin knows the

location and has key/combination. 2 – In a watertight food container (Glad, Tupperware, etc.) in the refrigerator. Most refrigerators are fire resistant. Additionally, a refrigerator is heavy enough to fall through the floor of a building into the cooler part of the fire in the basement and better survive. Finally, a refrigerator is large enough to be easily located in the ash and ruble of a fire or other serious incident. (As a bonus, everyone has a refrigerator, not everyone has a fire resistant storage box). Be sure to inform you spouse and relatives where to locate your Separation Document – and any other important papers.

As a reminder, the preferred method of submitting a request to the National Personnel Records Center (NPRC) is via the Internet. Please note that in some cases using a browser other that Internet Explorer may create problems with data entry. As you know, the NPRC provides copies of documents from the military personnel records to authorized requesters. Our web-based application will provide better service on these requests by eliminating our mailroom processing time. Also, since the requester will be prompted to supply all the information essential for us to process the request, delays that occur when we must go back for more information will be minimized. This improved on-line request should be used INSTEAD OF Standard form 180 for requests from the veteran or the veteran's next of kin, if possible. Your assistance with this initiative will allow us, and you, to better serve the needs of our veterans. If you do not wish to use the Internet, you should use Standard Form 180. You should print Standard Form 180 as you need it, not in advance because the form is periodically revised and updated. It should not be available on your website. You can have a link to the NPRC web page. The link is: http://www.archives.gov/veterans/military-service-records/standard-form-180.html

Since the Standard Form 180 is updated periodically, it is NOT recommended that large quantities be printed/photocopied and stocked. The form will be updated with the new address within six months. The US Postal service will forward mail if requests are mailed to the old location until February 2012.

Durham VA Medical Center has expanded its parking with a new garage that adds 436 parking spaces to help Veterans easily access the medical center. The new structure, called Parking Garage B, provides convenient access to the medical center from its Erwin Road entrance. It features light-emitting diodes (LED) lighting, security cameras, and a covered walkway from parking area to the medical center. Parking Assistants are available to assist Veterans from vehicles to their medical appointments.

IMPORTANT ANNOUNCEMENT for veterans who receive care at Durham VAMC: Effective April 1, 2012, the Durham VA Medical Center will use Electronic Funds Transfer (EFT) to reimburse Veterans for their Beneficiary Travel claims. This change will eliminate cash payments on the same day of treatment. There are many factors determining travel eligibility and it is important Veterans with questions get accurate information. Veterans may call (919) 286 – 0411, extension 6237 with questions that are not answered on their website. A notification letter of these changes is attached to this newsletter.

Up date letter for the Playground Project for the orphanage in Vietnam being done by NCVVI Friends, Supporters and Members,

A little over a year ago The North Carolina Vietnam Veterans, Inc. through its Bridge Back Foundation made a commitment to again reach out to the children of South Vietnam as we did in 2009. We would like to take this time to, "Thank You," those who have already helped, those who are going to help, and those who would like to make a donation but just can't. We appreciate you, your thoughts, prayers, and support. We have come a long way in realizing this commitment only through the generosity and greatness of our friends, supporters and members.



With the outstanding assistance of Colonel Hien Vo and his guys, the Vietnamese American community, Wood Play of the Carolinas, students of Athens and Cary High School "Lessons of Vietnam" curriculum and those supporters who have contributed, we are well on the way. Approximately \$15,000 in playground equipment has been purchased with a very heavy discount and is to arrive in Vietnam the last of January 2012. A team of Bridge Back volunteers are scheduled to return to Vietnam in March 2012 to put up the equipment and deliver the additional items. Funds are still needed to cover the delivery cost of the equipment to the orphanage, yard work, concrete preparation, concrete, landscaping, clean up and several pieces of play equipment to be manufactured there. Blind aids as well as funds are being collected also to go to a home for the blind children at the Quang Tri Province Home for the Blind.

The students at Athens and Cary High School are participating with their packets of personal and local memorabilia that will be delivered by the returning veterans to high school students of Vietnam. *Over 600 children's lives will be affected in a positive manner*. The Orphanage serves 75 hearing impaired, and other handicapped children along with 300 additional children served by the orphanage, the Home for the Blind that serves 50 students and the Vietnam High School students will all be touched by your generosity. The local students who will be impacted by being able to correspond, learn and share with Vietnamese students. This will give our children an opportunity to appreciate our country and the freedoms we enjoy.

Any contribution to this amazing international project is a tax deductible opportunity for you to participate and be part of "The Bridge Back."

Also items for the Quang Tri Home for the Blind.
